Presentations:

Students will provide an in-class presentation for each paper written. Presentations will be designed to mirror the experience of presenting at the National and International Communication Association conferences.

Grades:

Technology:

Make-up Policy:

Student athletes must provide advance notification of any absences.

Penalties will range from a minimum of 20 points to a maximum of 100 points. In the event of a point deduction, students will receive written correspondence that documents the event and the penalty.
