### Grade Breakdown

Activities 20 points (10 @ 2 points)

Some assignments will be given to be completed out of class but most will be inclass. Only excused absences will be able to make up in-class points. Twelve assignments will be offered. Ten will count toward your grade, completing more than ten will count toward your extra credit.

Assignments 20 points (4 @ 5 points)

Assignments will be given to help students engage with the material and deepen understanding of the topics. Assignment instructions will be posted to Carmen as they are assigned to the class. Please pay attention to instructions and submission requirements!

Exam- 60 points(3@20points)

The final exam will be administered during finals week. A study guide will be provided for each exam.

## Readings

Readings scheduled for that day are to be completed <u>before</u> class meets. Materials from readings are fair game for quizzes and the exam even if they are not covered thoroughly in lecture. The intention is not to trick you but to not spend limited class time on concepts made clear from the readings.

## **Challenging a Grade**

I am more than willing to discuss a grade with you but never over email or during class time. Grades are private matters not to be discussed in public. If you wish to challenge a grade you must follow these steps: 1. Read the accompanying comments and think about their validity. 2. Email within one week of receiving the grade to make an appointment. 3. Bring along the assignment in question and a written explanation of why the grade should be altered. The resulting review of the grade may result in the grade being raised or lowered.

### **Academic Misconduct**

The Ohio State University's *Code of Student Conduct* (Section 3335-23-04) defines academic misconduct as: "Any activity that tends to compromise the academic integrity of the University, or subvert the educational process." ## Flu or Flu-like Illness

Students should <u>not</u> attend class while ill with influenza. Students with flu-like symptoms will be asked to leave class. The illness and self-isolation period will usually be about a week. It is very important that individuals avoid spreading the flu to others. Most students should be able to complete a successful quarter despite a flu-induced absence. If you are absent due to the flu, you will be provided with a reasonable opportunity to make up missed work. Completion of all assignments and exams assures the greatest chance for students to develop heightened understanding and content mastery. The opportunity to complete all assignments and exams supports the university's desire to enable students to make responsible situational decisions, including the decision to avoid spreading a

contagious virus to other students, staff, and faculty, without endangering their academic work. Students with the flu do not need to provide a physician's certification of illness. However, ill students should inform their teachers (but not through personal contact in which there is a risk of exposing others to the virus) as soon as possible that they are absent because of the flu.
