Course description

This is an upper-level course on the social implications of communication technology. We will cover many communication technologies such as social networking sites, online dating sites, video games, texting, mobile telephony, and virtual reality. We will also cover important issues that cut across multiple technologies, such as privacy, digital deception, and cyberbullying. At times, we consider the ways communication technology may affect society as a whole (e.g., the spread of fake news) as well as cases in which communication

technologies affect their individual users (e.g., the connection between social media and mental health).

Course learning outcomes

- Students will learn about the characteristics, functionality, and usage of communication technologies; a focus will be placed on identifying the unique properties of new communication technologies.
- Students will be able to explain the historical origin of the study of communication technology.
- Students will increase their knowledge of the effects of communication technology on ourselves and society.
- Students will apply existing theory and research findings to new media technologies.
- Students will develop strategies for using and managing communication technology in our daily lives.
- Students will build critical skills to analyze and interpret communication technologies and their messages.

HOW THIS ONLINE COURSE WORKS

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules** that are released one week ahead of time. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **3-credit-hour course**. According to Ohio State policy (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of students' expected participation:

- Participating in online activities for attendance: AT LEAST ONCE PER WEEK
 You are expected to log in to the course in Carmen every week. (During most weeks
 you will probably log in many times.) If you have a situation that might cause you to
 miss an entire week of class, discuss it with me as soon as possible.
- Office hours and live sessions: OPTIONAL
 All live, scheduled events for the course, including my office hours, are optional.

• Participating in discussion forums: 2+ TIMES PER WEEK

As part of your participation, each week you can expect to post at least twice as part of our substantive class discussion on the week's topics.

Descriptions of major course assignments

WEEKLY DISCUSSION POSTS This is the only group-based assignment. Each week you will be expected to take part in class discussions within your assigned groups. Discussions will take place over the course of Wednesday through Friday each week. You are expected (from week 2 onwards) to be making One discussion post AND TWO responses per week. Prompts for discussion posts will be provided. You are expected to address ALL components of the prompt. You should not be looking to make a point based on your own thoughts and then leaving. Instead, you should seek to engage with what other group members are saying and responding to them. Initial posts are due by Wednesday 11:59pm and at least 2 response posts are due by Friday 11:59pm. Each discussion post does not need to be especially long. Your initial discussion posts are expected to be around 150 words. Each of your responses should not be less than 100 words. An excellent discussion post (and response) should demonstrate 1. Understanding of the concept(s) in the material provided 2. Independent thought regarding the concepts and material 3. Thoughtful response to the work of at least 2 other students in the class. From Week 7 onward, group assignment will be shuffled so you can interact with other peers in the class.

QUIZZES Four quizzes will be administered on Carmen. The quizzes are designed to assess your understanding of the readings and audio lectures. The first quiz will be on Week 2. All quizzes are announced and available on your weekly schedule. These quizzes cannot be made up. Quizzes will open a week before the due dates. You have A WEEK to complete the quiz. The quizzes will be open book/notes and cover material from the textbook, other readings, and lecture. Some of the material on the quizzes may reappear on exams. The quizzes are non-cumulative. The quiz description in Carmen will state which material each quiz covers. You have 1 attempt to take each quiz, and quizzes are timed. Due dates are listed in the course calendar below.

REFLECTION PAPERS You will complete **five** reflection assignments over the course of the semester. Due dates are listed in the course calendar below. You will need to cite any sources that you use for these assignments. Your reflections will be reported in a 2.5-page minimum double-spaced paper, complete with outside references. We will use APA style citations in this course (either the 6thor 7th edition is fine). An excellent submission will briefly explain the theory or concept and then go into depth, making a connection between the concept and a real-world application. A complete rubric and description for each will be provided on Carmen when the paper is assigned. Note that we can only grade what you have submitted. Double check before submitting your work.

EXAM One exam will be delivered on Carmen to assess comprehension of reading and lecture materials at the end of the summer term. The exam will cover information from textbook readings, other readings, and lecture. They will feature some combination of multiple choice, true/false, and

matching style questions. I will design the questions to assess your definitional understanding of course content and ability to accurately apply, interpret, and evaluate human communication and behavior through the lens of course concepts.

EXTRA CREDIT Students may earn up to three points of extra credit by participating in the School of Communication's Communication Research Experience Program (C-REP). One hour of research participation is equal to one point of extra credit. A non-research participation alternative is also available if you do not wish to participate in studies or are ineligible to participate in a research study. The C-REP Summer 2021 Student Guide will be posted on Carmen as soon as it is available, and it has more details about research participation. If you want to obtain an alternate assignment or need to unlock your C-REP account, you will need contact the C-REP coordinator, Olivia Bullock, at bullock.181@osu.edu. Additional extra credit opportunities will be announced via Carmen throughout the term.

Late assignments

You can turn in **TWO** assignments late, no questions asked. These are called "freebies." In order to use a freebie, you must email me (Hubner.9) within **three days** after the due date has passed. You have a week to turn the assignment in for full credit. You cannot use a freebie for the exam.

- Tone and civility: Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember that sarcasm doesn't always come across online.
- **Citing your sources**: When we have academic discussions, please cite your sources to back up what you say. For the textbook or other course materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.
- Backing up your work: Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, such as Microsoft Word, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.
