#### **Course Information**

# Course description

Communication plays a vital role in the success and failure of almost any organization. To support their communication processes and to increase their performances, organizations use various information technologies and technological networks.

Thus, the course will demonstrate the influence of these technologies on communication and knowledge networks, and how technology changes the daily work of organizations, teams, and individuals.

Students will learn about technologies that impact organizational communication patterns, new organizational forms, and new challenges for organizational members as users of information technologies in a global business environment.

# Course outcomes

Students who have successfully completed this course will:

- -understand the role of information technology in organizations
- -analyze organizational communication related theories as they apply to our society
- -apply concepts to current events and case studies

# Mode of delivery

This hybrid course will be presented 35.5 % in-person and 64.5% online. The course will be broken up into 3 components, each totaling 55 minutes of class time per week.

- The live in-person component will be every Tuesday from 1:50-2:45 EST in Journalism 342.
- The live online component will be every Thursday from 1:50-2:45 EST on the Zoom link in the navigation bar in the course Carmen page.
- The asynchronous online component will open at the beginning of the week. For discussion-based activities the initial post will be due Thursday at 11:59 p.m. with the response post due by Saturday 11:59 p.m.

#### How this course works

A Carmen module will open for each week with everything you need to complete the week's materials and assignments. Each week follows a theme. Readings should be completed before attending Tuesday's in-person session. Tuesday's class time will primarily be devoted to lecture. Most Thursday classes will be completing a team-based case study or challenge. The asynchronous component will ask students to look at this topic from their individual perspective.

# **Assignment Information**

*In-class Assignments:* In-class assignments are an opportunity for students to apply the theoretical concepts learned each week to case studies and scenarios. In-class assignments are completed as teams and should be completed by the end of the class period. Your lowest ICA score will be dropped.

Thought reaction assignments: These assignments allow students to think about the topic from an individual perspective. Thought reaction assignments should be around 300 words for the initial post and roughly 100 words for each response. Students will review the posts of classmates and respond to at least two classmates per TRA. The lowest TRA score will be dropped.

Team Exercises: There will be two team exercises where students are asked to work together on a class topic. Those exercises will allow you to learn about views and attitudes of fellow students and how to take those different thoughts into consideration to discuss the topics and/or to come to a mutual decision. These are slightly more involved than the typical in-class assignments.

*Exams:* Exams for this course will be multiple choice, true/false, and short answer. Exams are not cumulative. The exams will be on Carmen and open for a 24 hour period. Students will have one 55 minute attempt.

Final projects: Students may work individually or in pairs on a final assignment that assignment gives you the opportunity for a more in-depth topic reflection and to apply your new knowledge based on the lectures of the class. If you are working together with other students, all team members will get the same amount of points so that it is a question of fairness and honesty that everyone contributes actively to create an excellent project. The project will be broken into 3 parts:

- Project prospectus (25 points)- the prospectus will provide a brief overview of the topic along with 5 scholarly references and 5 credible periodical or digital references to be used in the final project.
- Project paper (125 points)- the project paper is a 5-7 page, double-spaced paper exploring one of our course topics in-depth.
- Project presentation/ responses (75 points/ 25 points)- a 5-7 minute recorded presentation will be posted to the Carmen discussion board. Students will then watch other presentations and comment to receive full credit.

# Masks and social distancing

The university requires that everyone on campus wears masks indoors (for more information, see https://safeandhealthy.osu.edu/). Wearing a mask that covers your mouth and nose is important because it can help slow the spread of COVID-19. There are several reasons to do this, even if you are vaccinated. First, the "Delta variant," which is the dominant version of the virus that causes COVID in the U.S. today, is highly contagious, and has caused a huge increase in cases recently. Second, even if you are vaccinated, there have been some cases of "breakthrough" infection, where a vaccinated person becomes ill. These cases are much less severe than cases among unvaccinated individuals, but you still don't want to go through it if you don't have to. Finally, and most importantly, if you get COVID-19 you can spread it to other people, including young children and others who cannot take the vaccine. In short, masks help protect you and they help you protect other people.

Social distancing may also help slow the spread of COVID. Although classrooms are no longer configured to ensure that students can spread out, doing so may still be helpful if you have the opportunity.

#### **Attendance**

Given the continued high prevalence of COVID, including breakthrough cases among vaccinated individuals, **students should not attend class if they are feeling sick**. It is very important that individuals avoid spreading the virus to others. Most students should be able to complete a successful semester despite illness-induced absence. If you are absent due to illness, including but not limited to COVID, I will give you a reasonable opportunity to make up missed work. **You do not need to provide a physician's document of illness, but you should advise me via email as soon as you are safely able to do so.** 

# Inability to attend class sessions

If you are unable to attend in-person, please contact me. We will Zoom you in if you are able to participate virtually. If you are too ill to participate via Zoom, I will provide a recording of the session. I do need at least 2 hours advance notice so that I may gather the right equipment for recording. These recordings are not a substitute for the in-person learning experience. Instead, they are a tool to help those who are forced to miss class on account of illness to catch up. As such, recordings may fail to capture in-class activities, they may be incomplete in other ways, or they be entirely missing (e.g., in the event of a problem with the recording technology).
