#### **Course Objectives and Outcomes**

This course is a seminar focusing on the theory and practice of science communication to public audiences, designed for both communication majors and non-majors. Topics include how audiences understand and process science information, expert communication by scientists and policy-makers to public audiences, informal communication about science in museums and science centers, science journalism, the role of the mass media in shaping understanding and beliefs about science, edu-tainment and documentaries, and citizen-science. We will also focus heavily on the role that communication processes play in publicly controversial scientific issues such as Covid-19, global climate change, evolution/intelligent design, autism & vaccines, etc. Students in this class come from a variety of personal and academic backgrounds. Active and civil discussion is highly important in this class. Listening, questioning, and debate are encouraged; personal attacks are not.

**Instruction**: This is a hybrid course. The primary methods of instruction are lecture, in-class activities, and online discussion and activities.

### Mode of Course Delivery and Attendance Policy

This course is delivered as a hybrid course, with 2 hours dedicated to in-person lecture and 1 hour of online content per week. Given the continued high prevalence of COVID-19, including breakthrough cases among vaccinated individuals, **students should not attend class if they are feeling sick**. It is very important that individuals avoid spreading the virus to others. Most students should be able to complete a successful semester despite illness-induced absence. If you are absent due to illness, including but not limited to COVID, I will give you a reasonable opportunity to make up missed work. You <u>do not</u> need to provide a physician's document of illness, but you should advise me via email as soon as you are safely able to do so.

#### **Assignments and Exams**

**Required Readings**. There is no textbook for this course. Instead, PDFs of selected chapters and articles will be posted on Carmen for each class – refer to the course schedule for each day's assigned readings. Students are expected to complete all readings prior to class so that they will be prepared to discuss the material in class. If any student is interested in additional readings on the assigned or related topics, please feel free to contact me and I can suggest additional resources.

**Online assignments.** Every week there will be an online activity for students to complete that cover the week's themes. Grading will be based on completion. The assignment will be available from Monday after class and will close on the following Sunday at 11:59pm. I will excuse one missed assignment. Because of this, I will not accept late assignments.

**Science Documentary Review.** Students will conduct an academic review of a science-based documentary film from a list of films (or a film of your choice with instructor approval). Specifically, students will apply theories and concepts learned in class when assessing their chosen film. Importantly, this is a fun assignment that gets students thinking more deeply about the role of communication and mass media play in promoting public understanding of science. The paper will be about 5 pages double spaced, not including references. You will turn in your paper digitally through Carmen.

**Special topic paper.** This paper requires you to choose one topic area of interest (Pseudoscience, Covid-19, Open Science, etc) and assess the role of communication in the topic's challenges, scope, and impact to society. This paper will be about 10 pages double spaced, not including references.

**Quizzes.** You have two, twenty question online quizzes in this course. All quizzes will be assessed with multiple choice, fill in the blank, and short answer questions. Access to quizzes will be for a 12 hour period on a specific date (see course schedule) and you will be given 40 minutes to complete them. The first quiz covers material from the first half of the course; the second quiz covers material from the second half of the course. Both quizzes are open book/note and are administered on the course's Carmen site.

All quizzes cover in-class material as well as content from your readings. To do well in this course means you will need to read every assigned reading.

## **Course Policies**
