Course description

Current problems of the technologies markets and policies of new and developing media. This course will be delivered entirely online.

Course learning outcomes

This course is an introduction to major communication technologies and how people interact with and use them. Over the semester, we will discuss a range of older, contemporary, and emerging media. We will be considering and discussing the varying impact communication technologies have had on society, relationships, and individuals.

- Students will learn about the characteristics, functionality, and usage of communication technologies; a focus will be placed on identifying the unique properties of new communication technologies.
- Students will increase their knowledge of communication technology adoption and policy making.
- Students will increase their knowledge of the societal implications of traditional, new, and emerging communication technologies. Content will focus on historic, political, economic, relational, and psychological effects.
- Students will apply existing theory and research findings to better understand (1) their own use of communication technology, and (2) the possible effects of their technology usage.

HOW THIS ONLINE COURSE WORKS

Mode of delivery: Because this is a distance-education course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. This course is 100% online. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules** that are released one week ahead of time. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **3-credit-hour course**. According to Ohio State policy (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

Quizzes

All quizzes will be administered on Carmen. The quizzes are designed to assess your understanding of the readings and other course materials. All quizzes are announced and available on your weekly schedule. These quizzes cannot be made up and must be completed by the due date. Quizzes are due Sundays at 11:59 pm EST, with the exception of the final week of class. The quizzes are non-cumulative.

Reflections and Reactions

For 8 weeks of the course, you will be provided with a prompt that asks you to perform a task related to the course. This may include a reading, video, video game, etc. The prompt will ask you to reflect upon this experience and write a short essay on the experience. The response for each R&R is due Friday at 11:59 pm EST. Guidelines for discussion expectations are provided on Carmen. Responses should be 1-2 pages in length. There is no minimum length, however your reflection will be graded on how correctly and thoroughly you can apply specific course material to your experience. You will be expected to use APA to format your papers and properly cite your references. No title page necessary.

Exams

Two exams will be administered through Carmen. Each exam will contain some combination of multiple choice, true/false, and matching style questions. Material on the exams will primarily cover the section of the course leading up to the exam. However, given the cumulative nature of the course content, it is crucial you understand the prior concepts in order to apply them to later concepts. Questions will include material covered in lecture and in the readings.

Late assignments

Written assignments must be submitted by Friday at midnight on the assigned due date. You will have access to them from the beginning of the course and are always allowed to work ahead; thus, no excuses will be accepted, barring extreme circumstances. Assignments will not be accepted late. Make your best effort to submit assignments on the due date. You must have a medical excuse or a note from Carmen/Canvas staff documenting an actual Carmen/Canvas problem that would have affected your submission to have a quiz or writing assignment accepted with no penalty after the upload box closes. Please note that OCIO staff are able to see when you last logged in, what Carmen pages you navigated to, and how long you were on each page.
