Prior Coursework Expectations

Students in this senior level course are expected to have taken COMM 3160 Communication Research Methods, COMM 3163 Communication Industry Research Methods, or an equivalent research methods course.

Course Learning Goals

This course is designed to provide students with understanding and perspectives on new media effects on health outcomes and new media-based intervention approaches to improving health. It pays attention to the characteristics and features of new media and their implications for public health. Students will analyze theory and research to examine how new media can be effectively utilized for the design and evaluation of interventions and for improving the health conditions of individuals and society.

Course Learning Outcomes

By completing course requirements and participating in course activities, students should be able to do the following by the end of the semester:

- 1. Obtain theoretical knowledge about the effects of new media on public health;
- 2. Utilize the theoretical perspectives to examine new media related problems and solutions; and
- 3. Apply theories and concepts to the development and evaluation of new media-based interventions.

Course Format

This course is comprised of both outside- and in-class activities: Students will engage in independent learning activities outside class in addition to participating in in-person classes. By blending these two components, this course is designed to foster active learning experience. Prior to class meetings, students should read assigned materials to complete a preview quiz. During class, students will be provided with in-depth explication of concepts and theories via lecture and will be provided with opportunities to complete in in-class exercises and actively participate in discussions about the topic at hand. After each class meeting, students will be asked to complete a response assignment designed to help them better retain and apply the concepts of the week.

Preview quizzes

The goal of the quizzes is to help students examine reading materials prior to class meeting and be prepared for in-class engagement. Each quiz will be consisted of approximately three to five questions. Questions will concern the concepts and conceptual frameworks presented in the articles and will be in true/false, multiple choice, and multiple answers formats. Unless indicated otherwise, the quizzes will be activated on Carmen by 11:59pm Wednesdays and will close at 11:59pm Tuesdays the day before class during which the answers will be reviewed. There will be a total of eight quizzes and three lowest scores will be dropped in the computation of the final grade.

Response assignments

To help students better able to retain, apply, and utilize the content of the week, the instructor will pose questions on Carmen. The questions will be about the key concepts covered in class. Students will be asked to critically think about the topic, make connections to real life situations, and develop creative solutions for problem solving. Accuracy in conceptual understanding and the utilization of the understanding for effective application will be evaluated. Unless indicated otherwise, the questions will be activated on Carmen by 11:59pm Wednesdays after class and will close at 11:59pm Tuesdays the day before class during which the response will be reviewed and discussed. Out of the total eight responses, three lowest scores will be dropped.

Exams

Two online exams are scheduled for the semester. Each online exam will be proctored using Proctorio (see Course Technology below) and in a close-book format. Exam 1 will cover all content covered prior to the exam. Exam 2 will be comprehensive, covering all topics of the course. Exams can cover any course materials including lectures, assigned reading materials, class discussion, and information from classroom review of assignments including preview quizzes, in-class exercises, and response assignments. Each exam can be any combination of true/false, multiple choice, multiple answers, and open-ended questions asking for short- and long-answers. The instructor will provide a study guide and a review session prior to each exam.

New media intervention project

Overview

The goal of this project is to provide students with an opportunity to analyze and evaluate an existing new media intervention and, on the basis of the assessment, propose improvements to the intervention. Students will choose a new media based intervention study from a set provided by the instructor. They will evaluate the intervention per the criteria provided by the project guidelines and justify their evaluation through research (e.g., about the health issue, the population, the technology). Based on the evaluation, students will then proposed improvements to the intervention including its components and structure. The instructor will provide a detailed guide for the project in a separate handout on Carmen later this semester.

Teamwork evaluation

Students will evaluate other team members' contributions to the term project. A detailed evaluation form will be available later this semester on Carmen. Evaluation criteria will include frequency of participation, quality of ideas, efforts, and attitude. Not submitting the teamwork evaluation form will result in a zero point for that portion of your grade.

Presentation

Each team presentation will be approximately 10-minute. Presentations should focus on the strengths of the intervention, areas needing improvement and the rationale, and the specific modifications or additions that you are proposing. Detailed guidelines for the content and time allocation will be provided later this semester in a separate handout.

Other teams' presentation evaluation

Each student will evaluate other teams' presentations on April 12. The instructor will provide evaluation form which is comprised of qualitative comments and quantitative ratings. The instructor will assess the specificity, informativeness, and usefulness of the comments and the consistency between quantitative and qualitative evaluation.

Written report

Each written report should address all items requested by the instructor and should highlight the data, facts, and other information gathered through the requested research, detailed rationale leading to the evaluation of the existing components and to the proposal of new components, and the team's own modifications or additions to the intervention. The bibliography should use American Psychological Association style. A detailed guide will be provided in a separate handout later this semester on Carmen.

Reflection paper

The goal of this assignment is to help students analyze what they have learned and how they learned it, and plan on how they will use the knowledge in future research and/or action. Each student will submit a 500-word reflection paper at the end of the semester. The specificity of the description of what and how one learned, the accuracy of the conceptual references, and the depth of self-reflection will be evaluated.

In-class participation

Students are expected to come to class after having read the assigned reading materials and being prepared for discussion. The instructor will evaluate the quality and quantity of participation. Quality is more important than quantity. Quality of participation is defined as the degree to which it demonstrates the student's understanding of the readings, is relevant to the theory and practice presented in the readings, stimulates other students' interest in and discussion of the topic of the day. Quantity is defined as the regularity and frequency of participation. Asking questions is an important form of class participation. Furthermore, asking thoughtful questions and providing constructive suggestions during project presentation is a very important form of participation.

Late Assignments

Late assignments will be graded down 10% per calendar day. For team assignments, make sure that the designated person in your team submits the work on time. Note that the preview quiz and response assignment cannot be made up for the following reasons.

- 1. Students are given an ample time window to complete these assignments on Carmen.
- 2. Answer keys to the preview quizzes are given immediately after the submission window closes.
- 3. The instructor, after reviewing the response assignments and application exercises, will integrate them into the day's lecture.
- 4. Therefore, for fairness in grading, as well as active learning goals and timely progress of the course, a make-up of these assignments is not feasible.
- 5. Finally, as indicated above, three lowest scores of these assignments, including zeroes from missed ones, will be dropped in the computation of the final grade.
