COMM 3554 SOCIAL IMPLICATIONS OF COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY

SUMMER 2024 ONLINE COURSE

Course description

This is an upper-level course on the social implications of communication technologies. We will cover an array of technologies, such as social networking sites, online dating sites/apps, video games, user-generated content platforms, and virtual reality platforms. Throughout the course, we will devote attention to important social issues that implicate communication technologies, such as digital deception, cyberbullying, privacy and surveillance, digital sexual content, and political influence campaigns. We will consider ways in which these technologies may affect societies as wholes (e.g., "fake news" and mis- or dis-information), as well as how they affect individual users (e.g., social comparison and its effects on mental health).

Learning goals

The aim for this class is to enable you to:

- Recognize and describe the characteristics, functionalities, and uses of comm. tech.
- Understand historical paradigms in the study and popular interpretation of comm. tech.
- Recognize and classify different types of communication or media effects, as well as describe, infer, and hypothesize about these effects on individuals and on societies in a critical and evidence-based manner.
- Navigate contemporary discourse about comm. tech in an informed and scientific way.
- Apply existing theory and evidence to understand the properties of and to analyze the implications of new/emerging tech, to the extent possible.
- Critique existing theory and frameworks for where they fall short in guiding our thinking about new/emerging tech and suggest modifications or other improvements to theory.
- Develop effective strategies for using and managing communication technology in your own life.

Embedded Literacies: Goals and Expected Learning Outcomes

This course fulfills the Technology Embedded Literacy in the General Education curriculum.

Students who are taking this course to fulfill their Technology expected learning outcome are expected to develop familiarity with specific forms of technology, and of their practical possibilities and limitations in relation to particular disciplinary or interdisciplinary projects.

Successful students will develop a critical appreciation of the relations between technologies and their contexts (social, cultural, historical) and of the range of effects and consequences (legal, ethical, political) produced or enabled by particular technologies. They will be able to:

- Critically describe the relationships between technology and societies in historical and cultural context.
- Recognize how technologies emerge and change.
- Evaluate the social and ethical implications of technology.

Course structure and requirements

This course is 100% online. There will be no mandatory sessions for which you must be logged in to Carmen or Zoom at a scheduled time. Office hours are held at scheduled times, but these are not mandatory – though, of course, I encourage you to see me should you want to.

The course will last eight weeks. At the start of each week, a new module will become available on the course Carmen site. This module will contain all of the materials and content associated with what we are doing that week. Typically, this will include one or more short lecture videos, additional reading materials, and assignments, plus any other materials we are using that week.

I will post an announcement on Carmen when the module becomes available. As long as you are meeting your deadlines, you may schedule your work during the week as you please. Some assignments will be due by the end of the same week. You are expected to log in to the course Carmen site at least once per week to access the modules.

This is a 3-credit-hour course. According to Ohio State policy (<u>www.go.osu.edu/credithours</u>), students should expect to spend around 3 hours per week on direct instruction (lectures, quizzes/exams, and other Carmen activities), plus up to 6 hours on class prep and homework (reading and assignments) to receive a grade of (C) average.

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Assignments

Weekly discussions

Every week, you will submit a response to a question prompt that I will assign. The prompt will introduce some contemporary issue pertaining to communication technologies and raise an open question regarding the issue.

You are expected to address all components of the prompt. To earn full credit, you will need to demonstrate understanding of both the prompt itself and of relevant course materials and show that you can apply what we're learning in class to thoughtful discussion of real-world communication phenomena. Your responses will need to be 150-250 words long, and they will be due on Fridays by 11:59pm. I will drop your lowest discussion score.

Please note that these discussions are NOT a glorified participation score. I expect to see that you have put some thought into your responses.

Please also note that your classmates will be able to see your posts.

Quizzes

Three quizzes will be administered on Carmen. The quizzes are designed to assess your conceptual understanding of, and your ability to apply, the course materials. All quizzes are prescheduled as per the course schedule. You will have the full week to complete each quiz; they will be due on Sundays at 11:59 pm. You will have only 1 attempt to take each quiz, and each quiz is timed. I do not usually permit students to make up missed quizzes unless there are reasonable extenuating circumstances. The quizzes are open book: Feel free to refer to course materials and/or to your own notes while taking the quizzes. You must, however, complete the quizzes working solo, which means you may not communicate with anyone while working on your quiz. Some of the material on the quizzes may reappear on exams.

Short analysis papers

You will complete three short papers over the course of the semester. Due dates are listed in the course calendar. The point of these papers is for you to engage in independent critical analysis of some "problem" as it relates to communication technology. Prompts will be provided in advance. You will communicate your analysis via a 2-page double-spaced paper (i.e., roughly 500 words, not counting your reference list), complete with references.

A good paper will briefly explain relevant theories or concepts before engaging in a thoughtful analysis, making clear connections between concepts and real-world phenomena, and describing and/or explaining any relationships therein. A rubric and description for each paper will be provided on Carmen when the paper is assigned.

You will need to cite any sources that you use for these assignments. We will use APA-style citation in this course. APA resources are available in the first Carmen module.

Please remember that I can only grade what you have submitted. So, double check your work before you submit it. Your papers will be due on Sundays at 11:59 pm.

P.S. The use of generative-AI technologies such as ChatGPT and Sudowrite to prepare work that you submit as the product of your own efforts is not permitted during this course. Please see the course policy on academic integrity for more information.

Final Exam

One exam will be completed on Carmen to assess your holistic comprehension of the course materials at the end of the term. The exam will cover information from textbook readings, other readings, class discussions, and my lecture videos. They will feature some combination of multiple choice, true/false, matching, and short answer questions. I will design the questions to assess your understanding of course content and ability to accurately apply, interpret, and evaluate mediated human communication and behavior through the lens of course concepts.

The exam is remotely proctored, and you will need to finish it in one sitting.

The instructor reserves the right to adjust the denominator on the exam should it turn out that a question is incorrect, unfair, or unnecessarily confusing. The same holds true for quizzes.

Extra credit

There are three opportunities for extra credit in this class, which add up to 14 points or 4% of the total possible points earned through regular assignments.

- You may earn up to 6 points of extra credit by participating in the School of Communication's Communication Research Experience Program (C-REP). One hour of research participation is equal to two points of extra credit. A non-research participation alternative is also available if you do not wish to participate in studies or you are not eligible to participate in a research study. The C-REP Summer Student Guide will be posted on Carmen. If you want to obtain an alternate assignment or need to unlock your C-REP account, you will need to contact the C-REP coordinator.
- 2. You may earn up to 4 points of extra credit for finding and emailing to me a journalistic piece (article, video, or podcast) in a major outlet that describes in detail some effect or relationship that we have talked about in the class. In the body of your email, please say which effect or relationship you think the piece is describing, and why.
- 3. Finally, in the spirit of boosting response rates to course evaluations, you may earn 4 points of extra credit for completing your SEI for this course by the due date. You will need to submit a screenshot of the submission confirmation message. (Do NOT include the actual evaluation scores or written comments; I only want to see the confirmation message.) I will set up a Carmen assignment for you to submit these near the end of term.

Late assignments

A **2-hour grace period** is given for some assignments (discussions and short papers) to ease any technology or personal issues that may arise. Late submissions for assignments will not incur a penalty during the grace period, but they will incur a **25%** penalty immediately after that, plus an additional 25% for each day the submission is late. If you must submit an assignment late, please DO NOT email your paper directly to the instructor. Let me know, and I will re-open the assignment for you on Carmen so that you can upload it for the Turnitin check. Your assignment will not be counted as having been submitted until you have uploaded it to Carmen.

You must have either (a) a medical excuse or (b) a note from Carmen staff documenting an actual technical problem (with Carmen) that affected your submission to have a paper or post accepted with no penalty after the assignment period closes.

This late-submission policy is only applicable to written assignments (short papers and discussion posts). Late quizzes and/or a late exam will NOT be accepted at all, barring exceptional and documentable extenuating circumstances.

Instructor feedback and response time

I try, and am usually able, to grade your discussion posts within 3-5 days.

For your short papers, you will be able to see feedback within 7-10 days.

For quizzes, you will be able to see your score immediately. For the exam, however, you will only be able to see your score after the exam period ends.
