#### **Course description**

This is an upper-level course on the social implications of communication technology. We will cover many communication technologies such as social networking sites, online dating sites, and virtual reality. We will also cover important issues that cut across multiple technologies, such as privacy, digital deception, and cyberbullying. At times, we consider the ways communication technology may affect society as a whole (e.g., the spread of fake news) as well as cases in which communication technologies affect their individual users (e.g., the connection between social media and mental health).

#### **Course learning outcomes**

- Students will learn about the characteristics, functionality, and usage of communication technologies; a focus will be placed on identifying the unique properties of new communication technologies.
- Students will be able to explain the historical origin of the study of communication technology.
- Students will increase their knowledge of the effects of communication technology on ourselves and society.
- Students will apply existing theory and research findings to new media technologies.
- Students will develop strategies for using and managing communication technology in our daily lives.
- Students will build critical skills to analyze and interpret communication technologies and their messages.

## Embedded Literacies: Expected learning outcomes (ELOs)

This course fulfills the Technology Embedded Literacy in the General Education curriculum.

Students who are taking this course to fulfill their Technology expected learning outcome are expected to develop familiarity with specific forms of technology, and of their practical possibilities and limitations, in relation to particular disciplinary or interdisciplinary projects.

Successful students will develop a critical appreciation of the relations between technologies and their contexts (social, cultural, historical) and of the range of effects and consequences (legal, ethical, political) produced or enabled by particular technologies. They will be able to:

- Critically describe the relationships between technology and society in historical and cultural contexts.
- Recognize how technologies emerge and change.
- Evaluate the social and ethical implications of technology.

## How this online course works

### Mode of delivery

This course is 100% online. There are no required sessions when you must be logged in to Carmen at a scheduled time.

### Pace of online activities

Each week, a new module will become available on the course Carmen site that contains all of the online requirements associated with that week. Each module will include materials (e.g., recorded lectures, reading materials, videos) pertaining to key course concepts, as well as instructions for completing the weekly readings and activities due that week. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within that time frame.

### Credit hours and work expectations

This is a 3-credit-hour course. According to Ohio State policy ([go.osu.edu/credithours](http://go.osu.edu/credithours)), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

### Attendance and participation requirements

Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of students' expected participation:

- **Participating in online activities: AT LEAST ONCE PER WEEK**

You are expected to log in to the course in Carmen every week. (During most weeks you will probably log in many times.) If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, discuss it with me as soon as possible.

- **Student hours and live sessions: OPTIONAL**

All live, scheduled events for the course, including my student hours, are optional.

## Course materials

There is no required textbook for this course. All reading materials will be provided on Carmen. Details about the assigned readings can be found on the schedule.

## Grading

This class has 750 possible points, which are distributed as follows:

Online Quizzes (x5)	250 points (50 points each)
Reflection Papers (x4)	300 points (75 points each)
Final Exam	200 points

## Assignments

- **Online Quizzes (50 points x 5).** Five quizzes will be administered on Carmen. The quizzes are designed to assess your understanding of the course materials (i.e., module materials, video lectures, assigned readings).
  - All quizzes are announced and available on your weekly schedule. Specific due dates are listed in the course calendar.
  - The quizzes cannot be made up.
  - Quizzes will open at the beginning of the week and are **due Sundays at 11:59pm EST**. The quiz will be closed and will NOT be open to anyone after it's due.
  - Quizzes will be open book/notes and cover material from the readings, module content, and video lectures.
  - The quizzes are non-cumulative and the quiz description in Carmen will state which material each quiz covers.
  - Students will only have one 45-minute or hour-long attempt (depending on the quiz) to complete each quiz. I do not allow group work on the quizzes and doing so constitutes academic misconduct. Please prepare well and do not wait until the last minute to start a quiz, as technological issues can occur (see technology policy below for more details).
  - Quizzes will progress one question at a time (i.e., you cannot go back to change your answers).
- **Reflection Papers (75 points x 4).** There will be four reflection assignments over the course of the semester.

- Reflection papers are available on the weekly schedule. Specific due dates are listed in the course calendar.
  - Reflection papers will open at the beginning of the week and will be due **Fridays at 11:59pm EST**.
  - Reflection papers will be 600-800 words formatted using APA style (i.e., double-spaced, 12-point Times New Roman font, 1-inch margins) and citations for outside references (either 6<sup>th</sup> or 7<sup>th</sup> APA style citations are fine).
  - A complete rubric and description for each reflection paper will be provided on Carmen when the paper is assigned.
  - A high-quality submission will briefly explain the theory or concept and then go into depth, making a connection between the concept and a real-world application.
  - Note that we can only grade what you have submitted. Please double check before submitting your work.
- **Exam (200 points x 1).** One final exam will be delivered on Carmen to assess comprehension of reading and lecture materials at the end of the semester.
    - The exam will cover information from the assigned readings, course modules, and video lectures.
    - The exam will consist of a combination of multiple choice, true/false, and matching style questions. The questions will be designed to assess your definitional understanding of course content and ability to accurately apply, interpret, and evaluate human communication and behavior through the lens of course concepts.
    - The exam will be timed and progress one question at a time (i.e., you cannot go back to change your answers).

## Late assignments

All deadlines are in Eastern Standard Time (EST). Students may submit reflection papers late with a penalty. Penalties for late work increase cumulatively. Submitting work after the deadline yields a -10% point penalty for the submission. For each additional day after the deadline, students lose an additional -10% off the submission.

Quizzes and the final exam will be closed after the due date and will not be reopened.

**Extensions:** Students may receive an extension for an assignment if they **contact the Graduate Student Instructor 48 hours prior to the submission deadline**. The length of an extension will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

## Discussion and communication guidelines

The following are my expectations for how we should communicate as a class. Above all, please remember to be respectful and thoughtful.

- **Writing style:** While there is no need to participate in class discussions as if you were writing a research paper, you should remember to write using good grammar, spelling, and punctuation. A more conversational tone is fine for non-academic topics.
- **Tone and civility:** Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember that sarcasm doesn't always come across online.
- **Citing your sources:** When we have academic discussions, please cite your sources to back up what you say. For the textbook or other course materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.
- **Backing up your work:** Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, such as Microsoft Word, where you can save your work, and then copy it into the Carmen discussion.
