SYLLABUS: COMMUNICATION 3402 CRIME AND THE NEWS MEDIA

Course description

This course will primarily be delivered in person. In this course, we will examine the various media that we consume multiple times daily and how they present information about crime and the criminal justice system. How do various media outlets decide what cases to report? What types of crime cases tend to get attention and why? What role does the media play in educating the public about crime and the criminal justice system? What role should it play? To what extent is social media influencing the public's engagement with the media and criminal justice?

We will help answer these questions through readings, discussions, lectures, guest speakers and audiovisual presentations.

Please note that course activities listed in this syllabus are tentative. You will be informed in a timely manner of any changes.

Course learning goals and outcomes

By the end of this course, students will do the following:

- Appreciate the role the media plays in influencing our understanding of criminal justice and public safety
- Appreciate the ability to challenge and change the performance of the media in its representation of crime and the criminal justice system
- Understand the realities of the criminal justice system
- Understand the realities of the media in its representation of the criminal justice system

Mode of delivery

This course will be primarily presented in person, but will have some online components.

- The live distance learning component will take place the last week of the semester (Dec. 1 and Dec. 3 classes)
- A simultaneous live distance component will be added to the in-person delivery
- Zoom will be the tool for the live distance component and will be recorded and posted on Carmen
- Carmen will be the tool for written communication, assignments and the delivery of midterm examinations. See technology requirements below.

Assignments

Participation (10%). Attendance, as well as your contributions to class, reading and online discussion assignments will be factors in determining your participation grade. There will also be in-class group activities. Attendance will be taken via **Top Hat beginning with the Sept. 1 class**.

The check-in assignment at the beginning of the semester is in this category. There may be some Carmen discussion questions, and other submissions as well. The check-in assignment is due in the Carmen dropbox, Thursday, Aug. 27, 11:59 p.m. EDT

<u>Midterm examinations (40%).</u> The midterm examinations will be based on reading materials and in-class content that can include audiovisual presentations, guest speakers, lectures and class discussions. There will be two midterm examinations each of equal weight. The first midterm is tentatively scheduled for Oct. 1 and the second midterm is tentatively scheduled for Nov. 5. Both examinations will be taken online using Proctorio. As in an in-person format, you will be given 80 minutes to complete it. However, because you will be taking it at different locations that may have various technological issues, the exam will open at 12:01 a.m. and close at 11:59 p.m.

<u>Mini-papers (15%).</u> This consists of three focused-writing papers that include reviewing two chapters in the textbook and a critique of the media's treatment of a national case. Each paper is due at designated times during the semester. More details will be provided on a separate handout and posted on Carmen. Each paper is worth 5%. Deadlines are as follows: Book chapter assignment 1, Sept 3; Book chapter assignment 2, Oct. 8, national case, Oct. 22.

Film analysis/review (14%). Write a 2-3-page review of a movie in the style of the *New York Times.* (http://www.nytimes.com/pages/movies/index.html)The movie should be on the topic of some aspect of the criminal justice system; however, I must approve it. A form will be posted on Carmen. Take a sophisticated position on the movie. In other words, do not just write that you thought it was good or bad. What was the movie's strengths/weaknesses with regard to helping us understand the criminal justice system? You are encouraged to interview anyone associated with making the movie or anyone who has knowledge about the criminal or justice-related issues portrayed in the movie. **Deadline is Oct. 15.**

<u>Film analysis/review topic (1 %).</u> You are required to submit your topic for the film analysis/review for approval. **Deadline is Sept. 18.**

<u>Group project (20%).</u> Each group of people, assigned by Carmen, will select a famous/infamous case study involving the media and crime, and make a multimedia presentation to the class. The time will be based on the number of groups. Each person will complete a form explaining, in detail, her/his role in the group, what went well and what could have gone better behind the scenes. Each group must present a different case. **Presentations can begin Nov. 24.**

Late assignments

No assignments will be accepted late. This means a grade of a zero for the missed assignment. Considerations will be given in instances when there are technical issues and illnesses. You must inform the professor within seven days if such problems kept you from completing assignments on time.

EXTRA CREDIT

There will be opportunities for you to complete work for extra credit. You may earn up to 6 points of extra credit that will be added to your examination scores. For non-C-REP activities, the professor will provide the requirements for earning the points. You are also encouraged to suggest ideas for extra credit. C-REP (Communication Research Experience Program) Research Credits: All students enrolled in COMM 3402 may participate in the Communication Research Experience Program ("C-REP"). C-REP is designed to give students direct exposure to the topics, goals, methods, and ethical issues of communication research. Participation can take the form of:

- · Completing two hours of C-REP research studies, OR
- · Completing two C-REP alternative written assignments, OR

• Completing a combined total of two hours of research studies and alternative writing assignments. You should NOT wait until the last minute to sign up for participation. It is wise to complete this as early as possible, when demands on your time are the lightest.
