

COMM 3668: Intercultural Communication Fall 2020 Online Class

This course introduces students to the concept and study of intercultural communication and explores issues related to intercultural communication praxis. In this course, you will develop a greater understanding of the challenges and complexities of intercultural communication in the global context. This course will be 100% delivered online.

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Course Objectives and Outcomes

The purpose of this course is to increase students' knowledge of the role of power, history, globalization, discourse, and language in intercultural communication settings. By the end of this course, students should be able to:

Students who complete this course will also:

- Acknowledge the importance of intercultural communication within human communication, specifically in terms of interacting with others
- Explain how individuals and groups manifest, express, perform, and negotiate culture through communication

- Discuss how race, class, gender, sexuality, ability, and nation are produced in various cultural contexts
- Analyze specific intercultural communication problems around the globe, illustrating the historical, cultural, economic, and political differences that affect their potential solutions
- Reflect on personal intercultural communication experiences in order to gain awareness of communication style; analyze strengths and areas for improvement when communicating with individuals from other cultures; recognize barriers to intercultural communication; and develop strategies to overcome barriers
- Apply knowledge of (inter)cultural communication patterns to enhance human interaction in a diverse society.

Mode of Delivery:

This course will be presented fully online.

- The live distance learning component will take place on Tuesdays and Thursdays during our originally scheduled time of 12:45pm 2:05pm.
- Each topic of the course will be divided into modules on Carmen.
- Weekly discussion posts must be posted by 11:59pm on Thursdays. You must respond to 2 classmates by Sunday at 11:59pm.
- Weekly journal entries must be uploaded to the appropriate Carmen dropbox by 11:59pm on Thursdays.
- Weekly quizzes will open on Mondays at 12:01 am. Quizzes must be completed by Sunday 11:59pm.

These required readings are embedded in each week's lecture post.

The lectures will interpret, demonstrate, and extend the information and ideas in the required readings, so be sure to take careful notes during each lecture and other videos. The exams will be based on both the lecture videos and the required readings. In addition to the **expected readings** embedded in each lecture, you will

also be expected to watch assigned documentaries and/or news programs. I will try to embed as many as possible on Carmen, but you may have to go beyond the module to access materials.

Grading Course Assignments:

1. <u>Final</u>. (100 points)

The final exam will consist of 8 essay questions. The goal of this exam is to make sure you regularly access course content and can use course information in applied settings.

2. Weekly Reading Journals. (120 points)

Each week you will complete a journal entry based on a prompt provided. You will be evaluated by your ability to respond to the question prompt and the quality of your writing. These will typically be between 300 - 450 words. There will be 14 possible entries and I will drop the two lowest scores.

3. Weekly Online Discussions/Comments. (120 points)

Once a week, you will be provided with discussion questions where you will be encouraged to share thoughts, find examples, and/or provide critique of lesson materials. Initial posts are due by Thursday at 11:59pm. You will then have to provide responses to at least 2 classmates' responses by Sunday at 11:59pm. I will be reading these and will let you know when a response is inadequate. There will be discussion questions posted each week except week 15, you may choose not to participate in two of them OR I will drop the two lowest scores.

Responses will be evaluated based on thoroughness, incorporation of course materials, and overall cohesion. Initial posts will be worth 6 points and responding to classmates will be worth 2 points each.

4. Weekly Quizzes. (110 points)

Weekly quizzes will be composed of objective questions (e.g., multiple choice, true/false) and will test your understanding of course content. You will receive only 1 attempt per quiz and have 10 minutes to complete each quiz. You are welcome to use course materials to complete the quiz, but I ask that you take the quiz alone (e.g., no partners). There will be 13 possible quizzes and I will drop the two lowest scores.

5. Syllabus Quiz. (10 points)

To make sure you understand the setup of this course, a short quiz about the course syllabus will be available on Carmen. You will be allowed to take this quiz multiple times to ensure that you understand the course syllabus. This will be done by 11:59pm on August 30th, 2020.

6. Group meeting attendance. (40 points)

By the end of week 2 (Sept. 4th), you will be placed in a group with 6-7 other people. This group will become your virtual study or accountability buddies. Starting week 3, I will be meeting with each group every other week with the intent of clarifying any issues in class and discussing course materials. All of these meetings will happen via Zoom.

Class Participation

All students are encouraged and **required** to *participate* in online discussions. The online discussion serves as a proxy for the in-class discussion we would have in a face-to-face setting. The goal of this requirement is to make the online class a lively, stimulating, and intellectually rewarding learning venture for everyone.

Discussion and communication guidelines

The following are my expectations for how we should communicate as a class. Above all, please remember to be respectful and thoughtful.

- Writing style: While there is no need to participate in class discussions as if you were writing a research paper, you should remember to write using good grammar, spelling, and punctuation. Informality (including an occasional emoticon) is fine for non-academic topics.
- Tone and civility: Let's maintain a supportive learning community where
 everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember
 that sarcasm doesn't always come across online.
- Citing your sources: When we have academic discussions, please cite
 your sources to back up what you say. (For the textbook or other course

- materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.)
- **Grade questions**: Questions about grades should be submitted via email within one week of the grade being posted to Carmen. Grade challenges should be made within one week of the grade being posted to Carmen. Grade challenges should be ½ to 1 page responses detailing why the student should receive a different grade and submitted to the teaching assistant and instructor. Understand that if I agree to re-review an assignment, you take the chance of receiving a lower grade.

Religious Holidays

Students who will be observing a religious holiday on a class date or assignment due date must provide date/event written notification to the instructor within the first two weeks of the quarter so that alternative arrangements can be made.

Course leave

If you become seriously ill or something happens to you that prevents you from participating in the course for an extended amount of time (e.g., mental illness or a friend's mental illness, taking care of an immediate family member, child birth, etc.), you may apply for course leave. You must let the instructor know of your situation as soon as practical when you become aware of the need for leave to avoid point penalties (either the day you learn of the need or the next workday). If you qualify for leave, I will allow you to make up missed work with the following point penalties:

- 0% for work due 6 days prior to notification
- 33% for work due 7-13 days prior to notification
- 66% for work due 14-20 days prior to notification
- 100% for work due > 20 days prior to notification
